US NAVY CHRISTMAS

US Navy Christmas: Celebrating the Holidays at Sea (excerpts from an article by Andrew Alex—July 3, 2023

US Navy Christmas – this is a phrase that elicits images of sailors celebrating the holiday season on board their ships, far away from home and loved ones.

The US Navy Christmas a tradition dates back to colonial times and has continued throughout American history, especially during World War II when celebrating Christmas at sea became prevalent. The celebrations involve planning events like dinners, concerts & parties while taking care not to impact operational capabilities adversely. Celebrating Christmas in the US Navy brings together sailors from various backgrounds, faiths, and nationalities to form a unique bond and creates a sense of community within the service while serving as an emotional boost for those spending long periods away from their families due to deployments or training exercises overseas.

As the holiday season approaches, many of us are looking forward to spending time with loved ones, enjoying delicious meals and exchanging gifts. However, for members of the US Navy who are stationed far from home, celebrating Christmas can be a unique experience. The celebrations start several weeks before December 25th when sailors begin preparing for festivities aboard their respective ships or submarines. This process involves planning events like dinners, concerts & parties while taking care not to impact operational capabilities adversely. Onboard any given ship or submarine you may find inflatable Santas adorning various surfaces along with strings of lights hung everywhere possible while crew members wear festive hats & sweaters alike! Ships bake cakes using recipes passed down through generations or serve up hot cocoa topped off with whipped cream – all part & parcel in creating an atmosphere similar to being on land over holidays instead floating amongst waves miles away and may include ceremonial readings (from biblical passages) by the ship's Chaplain or senior officers followed by carols sung by entire crews gathered together under starry skies atop deck. These moments are something sailors remember for years to come. One of their most popular traditions during this time is decorating ships with festive lights and decorations. This practice began in 1912, when USS North Carolina was decorated with lights for a night-time battle exercise.

Another notable tradition is the annual "General Order No. 11," which was issued by President Abraham Lincoln on December 24, 1862, allowing Union soldiers to celebrate Christmas day as a day of rest and reflection. The order also encouraged soldiers to attend church services and perform acts of kindness towards one another. In recent years, US Navy sailors have celebrated this holiday season by participating in charitable events such as Toys for Tots programs and volunteering at local shelters or hospitals.

When deployed overseas away from their families during Christmastime, it can be tough for members serving in the United States military – especially those stationed aboard naval vessels- to experience normal holiday activities such as exchanging gifts or eating traditional meals with loved ones. Some bases also organize voluntary food drives, toy collections and other charitable programs during this time of year in support of military families or veterans groups who may be in need over the holiday period. These events help foster a sense of community and goodwill amongst personnel and civilians alike.

The story of "Silent Night" is perhaps one of the most well-known Christmas tales related to US Navy history. In 1914, British and German soldiers called a temporary truce on Christmas Day during World War I, meeting each other between trenches while caroling with various instruments including bagpipes, trumpets etc.
